A few confusing, overwritten, tightly scrawled trail maps were handed out to further confuse any hashers who had just completed the bilocation process. The first little loop went through the Baseball fields, which allowed just enough time for Hannibal to park his car and start the run 5 minutes late.

Then it was off down the bush, with a series of checks and on-backs that kept the pack together and allowed the TM de jour to keep up and keep them guessing,

Curtseying was happy to be back in the bush, and the Hannibal and Duck were enjoying the bush trails – close to Sydney (but closer to Bankstown airport). Bingo, Rabbit, Joker and Spini recovered at the checks while Merkin, Squatting and Grewsome ventured off to find trail. Everyone loved the bush run, complete with ant's nest, spiders' webs, loose ground, sticks and stones and other trip hazards and wore their scratches like badges of honour.

Basically the trail covered many of the nooks a trails and crannies of 75% of the map – visiting many of the areas that were first discovered. Dundee was on to the trail and unintentionally nearly short-cutted on a number of occasions – (which of course he would have had he known the area a little better).

Half way around we met up with Tickle and Canookie who had encountered the Stack Overflow. It was not long after that that we ran past the lake (water views) up and around a small loop before heading to the final hill – climb home.

CIRCLE UP!!

Hannibal, dug through his diaries and found the only former reference he has to Bass Hill – and how he spent a couple of very "formative" evenings in his youth at the Bass Hill Drive In.

Sydney's drive-ins. During the 1950s, drive-in theatres began popping up all over Sydney.

Drive-ins were especially popular with courting couples and those on first dates, providing much more privacy than the cinema. For families it was a fairly inexpensive night out. The kids would come out in their pyjamas and would pile into the back seat on a mountain of pillows and blankets while parents didn't have to go to the effort of dressing up. Cars full of teenagers would smuggle in a few extra friends for free by hiding them in the boot.

Bass Hill drive in was located at the corner of Arundal Road and Johnston Road. The Skyline Drive-In opened as a single screen drive-in on 14th November 1956. It was the first

drive-in theatre to operate in New South Wales. It later became a twin with a capacity for 724 cars. The Bass Hill Drive-In was Australia's oldest continually operating drive-in theatre.

It was operated by Greater Union/Birch, Carroll & Coyle who closed it on 31st October 2007 and it was immediately demolished. Housing has been built on the site.

A patron recalled;

Bass Hill Drive-in in the early 80's..ahh. P plates on the Monaro, girlfriend in the back seat etc etc. In its early days it had a playground down near the screen which even ran a small ride-on train. I can still smell the chips from the cafeteria now...

Why did the drive-ins close?

Drive-ins were at their most popular in Australia during the 1950s and 1960s and it's believed, at their peak, there were around 330 of them. By the 1970s colour TV and later videos saw the popularity of drive-ins wane. This may have been accentuated by the oil crisis and the introduction of daylight saving which meant the drive-in had to start too late for most families. Finally, the large expanse of land they occupied became too valuable and was sold off for car parks, shopping centres, housing estates and apartments.

All of this history brought a tear to Sir Les's eye – when he remembered that he had had a root there. Thanks Hannibal – for bringing back these wonderful memories of our youth.
