Famous for:

- Probably only well-known feature is Boys Town, originally an orphanage, then a home for wayward boys. Thus is where Dundee was educated.
- In 2018' it was the first place in Australia to have a road built entirely with recycled material plastic bags, printer cartridges & glass bottles.
- Average house price is \$985k.

Pagewood

- Developed after WW1 to provide housing for returning troops.
- Originally called Monash Gardens, after Australian General Sir John Monash, who played a very large part in securing victory in WW1 for the Allies (google him he's a Legend)
- Then changed to Pagewood, after a local counsellor, Fred Page.
- Home to famous film studio, "National studios" from 1935 to 1959 produced many Famous Aussie movies - The Overlanders, Eureka Stockade, Robbery Under Arms, Smiley, and Summer of the 17th Doll, to name a few.
- Holden bought the site in 1959, and built cars there, as well WD & HO Wills produced Cancer Sticks there
- Pagewood Pub famous for Ian "Turps" Turpie running the Trivia there until his passing in 2012 at age 68. His claim to fame was that his girlfriend in the 1960's was Olivia Newton John.
- Average house price \$1.750 Million.
